The curriculum of the college is generally reviewed once in three years for UG,PG and M.Phil. While reviewing and revising the syllabus socially relevant and job oriented contents are given priority. Annual meeting of Board of Studies and Academic council ensures changes whenever the need arises.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- For effective teaching, the modern teaching aids used in the classroom are Lap-top, Computers, LCD projectors, OHP, Television and CD players.
- Students are encouraged to use PPTs for presenting seminars and projects.
- Under the auspices of the various Department associations workshops and seminars are organized to familiarize the students with the prevalent trends in the industries.
- Each Department invites experts from various fields to share their knowledge and expertise as part of Department activity.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) is done to test the progress of the students.
- The students appear for two internal tests and one pre-semester examination. It helps the students to revise their lessons, learn the question pattern and complete the answer script within the stipulated time.
- The Departmental examination committee scrutinizes the model question papers and conducts the exams vigilantly.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The Research and Development Cell functions with the aim of promoting research ambience in the institute.
- Faculty members are encouraged to apply for Research projects funded by TANSCHE and UGC.
- TANSCHE has initiated CLIL programme and a two day workshop was conducted for the faculty members of English Department(17.04.2017 and 18.04.2017)
- Free SET and NET classes were conducted for the Research scholars.
- Nearly Faculty are engaged in minor and major projects funded by UGC and TANSCHE.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure/Instrumentation

- **Library:** Every year funds are allocated for the purchase of books for updating information on current topics for the prescribed syllabus and recent developments in various fields.
- **ICT:** Every Department has been provided LCD projector. Computer labs provide hands-on training to students.
- **Physical Infrastructure:** Number of classrooms are not in proportion with the new courses and strength of the students. Proposals are sent to the Government of Tamil Nadu through our higher authority the Director of Collegiate Education. Shift system is adopted to accommodate the students and classes are conducted.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- At the end of each Academic year the workload for each Department is prepared and sent to the Directorate of Collegiate of Education. Vacancies are notified and generally filled during transfer counseling.
- Student representatives are allotted for each class.
- They act as a bridge between the faculty and class in the execution of regular academic activity.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The recruitment of faculty and administrative staff is under the purview of State Government.
- However, in case of necessity Guest Faculty Members are also appointed as per the directions from DCE.
- Non-Teaching staff members are appointed and paid through the funds raised by PTA.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction/Collaboration

- Department of Geology has signed an MoU Here Solutions, Bangalore.
- Departments are encouraged to make their courses of study relevant to industry.
- Industrial visits, lectures by industry experts and domain experts are regularly conducted.
